Highlights in Strawberry Research from the BC Berries Research Review

Earlier this year, the BCSGA held a joint Research Review meeting with the BCBC and RIDC. This full-day event featured presentations on most research projects currently being funded by the strawberry, raspberry, and blueberry industries. The morning was comprised of sessions on breeding, genetics, and variety trials. The afternoon featured sessions on horticultural management and fruit quality, entomology and pest management, and pathology and disease management.

There were nine presentations relevant to strawberries. An update on the breeding program was provided by our local breeder, Dr. Michael Dossett. The new Berry Entomologist at Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC) in Agassiz, Dr. Michelle Franklin, presented on a new insect pest in the region called the strawberry blossom weevil (*Anthonomus rubi*). From ES Cropconsult Ltd., Dru Yates highlighted their work in developing pest management guides for small-scale producers. Dr. Juli Carrillo from the University of British Columbia (UBC) presented her lab's work on ecological approaches to management of spotted-wing drosophila. This included information on the discovery and documentation of two parasitoid wasp species in BC, the Samba wasp (*Ganapsis brasiliensis*) and Ronin wasp (*Leptopilina japonica*). In the disease management session, I provided an update on suppression of plant parasitic nematodes using pre-plant fumigation and post-plant nematicides applied through the drip line.

During the morning session, a set of four presentations highlighted the BC industry's collaboration in the Canadian Berry Trial Network alongside researchers at the University of Guelph in Ontario (Dr. John Zandstra and Dr. Adam Dale), Carrefour Industriel et Expérimental de Lanaudière (CIEL) in Quebec (Dr. Pierre Lafontaine), and Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada in Nova Scotia (Dr. Beatrice Amyotte). This effort, in conjunction with the local breeding program, adds replicated comparisons on research sites to our ongoing trials to evaluate new berry cultivars and breeding selections in growers' fields. In BC, this work is currently being done at the Clearbrook Substation in Abbotsford.

Two rounds of strawberry trials were established in 2019 and 2020 with each research group evaluating cultivars for yield and fruit quality. In particular, the BC program's advanced selection BC 10-2-1 was included in these trials, and all three of our collaborators provided positive feedback in terms of marketable yield, firmness, and flavour for this dayneutral selection. Over the next few years, continued feedback from these other regions should provide the breeding program with the information required to determine whether it is worthy of release as a cultivar. If so, we are hopeful that it could a suitable replacement for cultivars such as 'Albion' and 'Seascape'. This remains an open question, however, as no selection delivers the "whole package" of traits that make it superior to cultivars currently on the market. For example, observations from our own on-farm grower trials indicate susceptibility to rain damage and a relatively squat canopy. These features need to be taken into consideration along with positive observations from other production regions.

Perhaps growers could think of soil-less production under protected structures to work around this BC 10-2-1's weaknesses while leveraging its genetic strengths? Or, maybe nutrient management needs to be adjusted from current practices used for 'Albion'? Only time will tell if this selection makes the cut. But, in the meantime, we continue to bring in new cultivars and selections from other breeding programs (e.g., UC Davis in California, US Department of Agriculture in Oregon), looking for any cultivar that will give local growers an edge.

Benefits of Membership with the BCSGA

The BC Strawberry Growers Association is very active in promoting BC's strawberry industry, making sure that it remains vibrant. This is done through numerous programs that are funded through levies producers pay on their strawberry production. Fresh levies are remitted directly to the Association, on Farm Gate/Direct sales, while processed levies are remitted by the processor to the BC Vegetable Commission who forwards these funds to the Association. Here is some of what the Association does and why growers can benefit by belonging.

The Association.....

- 1. Negotiates the annual processing price processors pay for strawberries purchased from growers.
- 2. Collects levies from fresh strawberry producers at the rate of \$0.075 cents per pound.
- 3. Manages the *Strawberry Industry Development Trust Fund*, that is used to support eligible industry activities. *These projects* include: research, grower education, promotion and market development.
- 4. Participates in the National setting of priorities for the approval of new pesticides for all applications.
- 5. **Organizes a "Fresh BC Strawberries" promotion campaign** generating fantastic support from the media. Radio interviews, on-site TV coverage, newspaper pictures & stories. Active campaigns on 2-3 Social Media platforms help to assist in bringing public awareness of the local strawberry industry throughout BC, with active contests that encourage and reward participation.
- 6. Works closely with berry breeders and other scientists testing new cultivars to identify varieties that are adapted to BC's climate and environment, thus enabling *members* to have access to the most current innovative varieties. *Funding research projects* to develop unique and economical production techniques for new and standard varieties using your levy dollars.
- 7. Has direct access to the Ministry of Agriculture, Berry Industry Specialist who supplies us with the most current information regarding new pests and other matters related to Strawberries. Provides this current and critical information to growers on invasive pests like Spotted Wing Drosophila. Is available to growers if there are production problems or other concerns, with the assistance of Breeders and Researchers.

... all of this is made possible because growers pay levies on their processed and fresh strawberry production. We encourage you to join the BC Strawberry Growers Association, pay levies on your strawberry production and help the BC strawberry industry to thrive, remain current and vibrant.
